2. Why do you think God gave the law and made violation of law punishable by shedding of blood? Is this fair or realistic? Why or why not?
3. Think through how a person would live through a typical week in America, in this valley. Get up, eat, drive to work, work, drive home, kids, meals, TV, movies, books, recreation, etc., just a typical week. Where in this typical week would the average American ever encounter the notion that there is a God? That this God is Holy and Powerful Creator to whom we humans are accountable for our behavior? That we are helpless because we have all fallen short of the kind of living God intended? Without having any hint of these eternal truths in a typical week, how could our fellow citizens become aware of their condition before God and need for Jesus?
